



How was this Scottish industry connected to the slave trade?



Herring

- Herring are **migratory fish** which means they move in big groups around bodies of water.
- The red dots on the map point to some of the villages in Scotland which became herring ports at the time of the slave trade.
- Greenock was the main port used to export "red herrings" to the Caribbean.
- The popularity of herrings and their importance to local economies gave them the nickname "silver darlings".
